In the Summer of 1995 the first SBA pitch was tossed and an official SBA atbat was born. At some point in the Spring of '03 our at-bat total will reach 1/4 million. We will have played more than 4,000 games, surpassed the 125,000 hit total, and consumed close to a billion hotdogs!? The quality of play is increasing every year. Players are getting better – better players are getting in. Players such as Kim Snyder, Dave Ewing, Beth Klein, and Steve Tow get better with every at-bat. Newcomers the likes of Neal Britton, Tom Strowhouer, Kevin Miller, and Jimmy Waltman, who have the ability to play in/on any league/team, have chosen to play SBA ball.

The safety and integrity of the game has been preserved. In 1999, where juiced bats were just starting to make their way into the league, men's league players hit 1 home run in every 41 at-bats. In 2000, juiced bats were everywhere and men's league players hit home runs to the tune of 1 in every 29.5 at-bats. In the years 2001 and 2002, when juiced bats became banned from use in our leagues, the home run rate dropped back to reality with a home run hit in every 41 and 43 at-bats respectively.

Heading the list trils spring will be the use of season games.

True coed softball (ASA) is played with an equal number of males and females in the field as well as the batting line-up. In the early years of SBA there just weren't enough females to go around so remedial rules were instituted to facilitate the forming of coed teams. Liberal substitution rules were enacted to ensure the games would be played. That is the case no longer. There are more than enough qualified females to fill every team in every league. Be that as it may, there is no reason why we can't convert the coed league substitution rules to coincide with that of the men's league. Men's league non-roster sub rule...

A team may substitute with up to 4 non-roster players; however, these players may be added to make a total of not more than **9 players** (men's league). In the event roster players become available, the non-roster substitutes must surrender their positions. All non-roster players must bat at the bottom of the batting order. Because of roster restrictions (eddie requirements) in coed softball, a slight adjustment/amendment is required. The following coed league non-roster sub rule will take affect beginning Spring 2003...

A coed team may substitute with up to 4 non-roster players; however

A coed team may substitute with up to 4 non-roster players;

A coed team may substitute with up to 4 non-roster players; however, these players may be added to make a total of not more than **9** fielders. There shall be no restriction to the number of batters. In the event roster players become available, the non-roster substitutes must surrender their positions. All non-roster players must bat at the bottom of the batting order.

Another bone of contention to be addressed is the use of grace periods. Teams that postpone the start of a game due to player shortages will be penalized. Any team that forfeits a game for any reason will then be required to post a \$45.00 bond for the remainder of the year. This bond will be used as insurance against further forfeits.
