A Look Ahead to the Softball New Year. A Look Back Over the Previous Year

Leagues will be forming in the weeks ahead. I have yet to reach out to last year's managers to get an idea of the number of available team spots in each league, but I will be doing so in the not-too-distant future. If you are interested in entering a new team in one of the 8 available leagues (5 men's and 3 coed), it couldn't hurt to fill out a full or partial team form located

With help from the league Rules and Competition Committee, (Curt Hensman, Bill Shipe, Bill Shallcross, Bill Brancato, Gene Walczak, Tom Koelzer, Jr., and Jamie Richards), the rule changes below will be instituted for the 2024 softball season.

Allowing females to bunt was put in place last year and will remain in effect for this year and beyond. Eddies are allowed a 2 nd foul ball with 2 strikes, but there was never a stipulation on how to handle a foul bunt attempt with 2 strikes. Moving forward, a foul ball with 2 strikes will not count as a strike out. The female eddie will receive the customary courtesy foul ball even on a bunt attempt.

The asterisk next to a team name in the league standing is nothing more than a reminder to the league statistician that the team was involved in a forfeit. The standard protocol scoring gives the team receiving the forfeit a 7-0 win ( 1 run for each of the 7 innings. Because runs-given-up is

Ari Silverstein made a nice run at top honors with a 756 batting average and league-leading 1927 slugging percentage. He knocked in a run at a clip of $102 \%$. Kyle Rossi, Shawn Hines and Brandon Birkhead rounded out the top 5 .

Coed league Core Player of the Year honors goes to Brian Dart who batted a league leading 729 and slugged at a rate of 1589. Alex Freeman finished a close 2nd behind Brian. Alex batted 720 and slugged 1500. Brandon Birkhead, Bill Brancato, and Ryan Goodman completed the top 5.

Amanda Clark will take her first-ever women's POTY award. Amanda batted a league-leading 625 and slugged a league-leading 953. Last year's POTY Tess Frelick batted north of 500 and slugged 931. Lissa Tercha, Stephanie Farrar, and Sarah Yoos were among the top point-getters.

Wackers Seize Spring, Summer, and Fall A Division titles. I'd Hit That, Slap a Pitch, and JT Bankers Each Grab a Piece of the B Division Pie.

The Sunday Afternoon Coed league of Softball America kicked off in 2023 with all of the 2022 championship winners returning with the goal of tasting glory once again, including Wackers, 3-time champions in the previous year, I'd Hit That, Hit \& Run, and Hagan's Heroes. The league continued with the balanced American/National League format implemented in Summer 2021 wherein the top two teams from each league would vie for an "A-Flight" finals berth against the top team from the other league. Likewise, the 3rd through 5th place teams would battle it out for a spot in the "B-Flight" finals against the advancing team from the other league.

## SPRING

All 15 teams took the field on April 10th, representing a increase in enrollment compared to 2022, which saw 14 teams in the spring season and 13 teams in the summer and fall frames.

In the American League, the 3-time 2022 championshipwinning Wackers (A Division in spring and summer, B Division in fall), rolled through the spring season with a perfect 80 record. Dirt Dogs secured the \#2 seed and an A-flight playoff berth with a 6-2 record. I'd Hit That (5-3), Wu Tang Forever (3-5), and Alaskan Bullworms (3-5) made the B-flight cut, while Team Envi (2-6) and Gwynedd Manufacturing (08) fell short of the playoffs. Wackers boasted a potent offense fronted by triple crown winner Bill Brancato, who led the league with . 885 AVG, 1.769 SLG, 20 R, 23 H, 9 2B, 4 HR, 26 RBI, and 46 TB. Sean Nonemacher (. 708 AVG, 1.292 SLG, 13 R, 5 2B, 3 HR), Brandon Roman (. 652 AVG, 1.217 SLG, 13 R, 4 2B, 3 HR, 11 RBI), Robert Akers (. 600 AVG, 1.160 SLG, 15 R, 7 2B), Alex Freeman (. 571 AVG, 1.190 SLG, $13 \mathrm{R}, 3$ 3B, $11 \mathrm{RBI}, 4 \mathrm{BB}$ ), female eddie Lissa Tercha (. 652 AVG, . 783 SLG, 10 R, 8 RBI), and male eddie Carman Brancato (. 652 AVG, .739 SLG, 12 R, 8 RBI) were also instrumental to Wackers' success. Dirt Dogs also had a deep roster, getting strong contributions from Matt Abramson (.724 AVG, 1.172 SLG, 14 R, 4 3B, 10 RBI), Elijah Robinson (.722 AVG, 1.444 SLG, 5 2B, 12 RBI), Jaden Newman (. 682 AVG, . 955 SLG, 11 RBI), male eddie Mike van Fossen (. 741 AVG, .815 SLG, 7 R), and female eddies Tess Frelick (. 567 AVG, . 967 SLG, 13 R, 3 HR, 18 RBI ) and Kate Valesky (. 478 AVG, . 500 OBP, 11 H). Robert Garcia (. 615 AVG, 1.269 SLG, 11 R, 5 2B, 10 RBI ) of I'd Hit That led the league with 4 HR, and teammates John Chrichton (.615 AVG, 1.077 SLG, 3 HR, 14 RBI), Donovan Ramos (. 600 AVG, .800 SLG, 11 R, $17 \mathrm{RBI})$, female eddie Selina Alicea (. 560 AVG, . 600 SLG, 10 R, 7 RBI ), and male eddie Roger Sternfeld (. 571 AVG, .619 OBP, . 714 SLG, 2 2B, $10 \mathrm{RBI}, 5 \mathrm{BB}$ ) rounded out the offense. Wu Tang Forever saw strong campaigns from Chris Hackney (. 690 AVG, 1.241 SLG, 17 R, 6 2B, 14 RBI), Kenny Goodwin (. 739 AVG, 1.304 SLG, 10 R, 3 HR, 15 RBI), Craig Richards (. 615 AVG, 962 SLG, 3 3B, 16 RBI, 4 BB), and male eddie Rich Stead (.714 AVG, 1.071 SLG, 9 R, 4 2B, 3 3B, 9 RBI ). Alaskan Bullworms got production from Evan Morris (. 583 AVG, 917 SLG, 9 R), Calvin Starosta (. 579 AVG, 1.053 SLG, 9 RBI), Sean Morris (. 583 AVG, .875 SLG, 9 R), Tom Ciampoli (. 615 AVG, 1.385 SLG, 13 RBI), and female eddie Victoria Roetman (. 500 AVG, . 682 OBP, 5 R), who easily led the league with 8 BB . The outfield eddie markers will be moved back 10 paces from 30 to 40 . This will give the eddies a much larger area with which to drop a base hit. The suggestion to make a called illegal pitch a dead ball was shot down. The sub rule which allows for teams to use an all-star sub if they take a batting out has been reworded to read as follows: A batting out will be taken if a team uses an all-star as a sub. In any instance, a team using any kind of sub can play with not more than a total of 9 players. Men's, Open, and coed league teams may not use more than 1 all-star as a sub.

The men's and coed league all-star lists will be finalized and posted soon. The all-star lists are used to determine which players will be added to the all-star restricted lists. The all-star lists work in conjunction with league rules to restrict how powerful a team can get by limiting the number of all-stars allowed on a team. The men's leagues allow for 7 all-stars per team. Open leagues (men's league where women are permitted to play) permit a maximum of 5 all-stars. Coed teams must abide by the all-star eddie rule which states a team must have in the line-up the same number of eddies as all-stars (1 male eddie and the balance female eddies) at all times.

As League Director, my job is to keep all leagues running smoothly, maintain fairness across the board, and make the game as much fun as it can be for as many league members as possible. One of the biggest buzz-kills year after year are forfeits. To me, being on the receiving end of a forfeit is worse than having your game postponed. While both are hard to accept, the forfeit is the tougher pill to swallow because it is completely avoidable and never rescheduled. League rules for using non-roster subs in the regular season are very generous and put in place to help short-handed teams play the game. Sub rules allow for up to 4 subs. In reality, a short-handed team needs only 4 roster players to play the game. Too many managers either don't know about league sub rules or are just too darn lazy put for the effort.

The league fee to join Softball America back in 1995 was $\$ 68.00$ per player. Quite a bit has happened to the cost of doing business since then. In fact, the cost of living has risen by a whopping $92 \%$ over the past 29 years. The last league fee increase ( $\$ 5.00$ ) was back in 2015. Since then, inflation has risen at a $29.86 \%$ clip. Softball America has been absorbing the increased cost to run the league for the past 9 years, but that cannot continue. I am sorry to announce league fees will be going up by $7 \%(\$ 5.00)$ to $\$ 80.00$ per player in 2024 . The additional $\$ 5.00$ will barely cover the increased cost of doing business which includes insurance, team registration, ball field rentals, trash collection, port-a-potties, grass cutting, Natural Lawn, utilities, softballs, field maintenance and so much more. Umpires, scorekeepers, journalists, statisticians, league fee collectors, and groundskeepers will all be earning more money. I wish there was a way around it, but unfortunately there is not. If you can no longer afford to play, there may be positions in the league where you can earn league fee credits, i.e. grounds keeping/field maintenance, scorekeeping, journalism, and umpiring.

Championship shirts for all 2023 winning teams that submitted their request by the January 20 deadline will be delivered to the winning managers at some point after the 2024 season begins. Curt Hensman, Cutting Edge Sports Apparel (CSA) will be handling the champ shirt production and delivery. Curt will also be conducting a league manager meeting this year at some point before the season begins. When the time and place is determined, announcements will be made on the SBA website, Facebook, and Twitter. Curt, along with other league umpires will be happy to answer any and all manager questions with regard to new rules as well as existing rules.

Plan your softball year in advance armed with the knowledge that league games will NOT be played on Easter Sunday, Memorial Day and Labor Day Sundays and Mondays. Games in 2024 will also NOT be played on Thursday, July 4th. Games WILL be played on Mother's and Father's Day Sundays as well as Halloween Thursday. However, and I make no promises, if the Thursday schedule allows, we may only play the 9:00 and 10:15 games in an attempt to accommodate the trick-or-treaters.

The scheduling format for the Sunday Men's league will stay pretty much the same as in years past with 5 separate divisions of play. Much like last year, single leagues such as Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday Men's will run as one division. Schedules in leagues that have a wide disparity of talent from top to bottom much like the Sunday, Monday, Wednesday Open and Friday Coed leagues will either be run in 2 divisions ( $A$ and $B$ ) or be divided into 2 equal leagues (American and National). With equally divided leagues (American and National), there will be no A or $B$ division for the regular season. There will only be an American League and a National League. Teams will play each team in their own league and a couple of teams in the other league. Once the regular season is complete, the top finishers in each league will play for the A title. The remaining eligible seeds in each league will play for the B title.

In the heat of competition, obscenities are bound to happen. I realize that. The game umps realize that as well. What I would like ask at this point is for ball players to keep the obscenities to a small minimum, especially when women and children are in attendance and/or when the game is played in a park setting. I've had numerous complaints in years past from league members who like to bring their kids to the game, but because of the unabashed use of blatant obscenities, they have now become reluctant to do so. I've also had complaints via the townships from passersby who've been offended by obscenities while visiting the park. The next time you feel the need to blow off steam with an obscenity, please, out of respect for others, exhibit a little self control.

I will try my absolute best to avoid Saturday make-up games. Just know that when a league falls too far behind schedule, playing on a Saturday may be the only option. League policy regarding postponements is very simple. If the ball field is playable at game time, the games are on save for extenuating circumstances. Some league members don't care about less than perfect field conditions and just want to play. Some don't want to play if a dog should so much as lift his leg near by. Others travel a distance to get to the field and don't want to make the trip for nothing. I can't favor one or the other. The best way to handle it is to have the ball field make the call. If playable, we play.

The consumption of alcohol at certain ball fields is strictly prohibited. All school district ball fields prohibit alcohol on school grounds. Hatfield prohibits alcohol on park grounds. Umpires will warn then eject any player(s) that fail to comply.

Playoff Player of the Year nominations are a result of formula based on the following categories: R\%, RBI\%, Avg, SIg, BB\%. Core players require a minimum of 27 ABs (including BBs) to qualify. Eddies require 24 ABs . The league's top 10 players are listed below.

Additionally, Hatfield has a strict 'no dogs allowed' on park grounds' policy. I strongly urge you to abide by these rules and regulations. Not doing so could result in our league losing its ball field permit and that is the last thing any of us want to see happen.

If you head over to the league message board and click on the uppermost forum labeled Important Announcements, you will see a topic entitled Conduct Unbecoming. Players that have been ejected or otherwise exhibited unsportsmanlike behavior are listed there. When a player is ejected from a game, a mandatory 1-game suspension (and at times more) will ensue. This is non-negotiable. The best way to avoid game suspensions is to not get ejected in the first place.

For reasons that escape me, the Memorial and Labor Day coed 1-pitch tournaments are ending up with fewer and fewer female entrants. Everyone has an opinion as to why, but few have any kind of solution. Listen, I have been a proponent of female softball since Day 1. I've done everything in my power to help the females be more productive and get more enjoyment out of the game. Eddie markers, courtesy foul balls, and bunting are just a few rules instituted to help the girls compete. For the 1-pitch tournaments I forced managers to draft girls before the 7th round and bat 2 girls in the first 4 line -up spots so they wouldn't feel like second-rate ball players. As the old adage suggests, "You can lead a horse to water, but you can't make him/her drink". The coed 1-pitch tournaments this year will start out as coed tournaments. If we don't get enough girls, the tournament will shift from a coed affair to an open affair. Open simply means the tournament will be classified as a men's tourney where women are eligible to play. To those of you that gave me a hard time last fall when I attempted to shift the tourney from Coed to Open, my suggestion is to step up and make a difference to help keep it coed when the time comes. I cannot do it alone.

Softball America has always been like one giant family. When one in the family is in need, the rest of the family steps up and helps. This was once again evidenced this past year when a league member's girlfriend needed seriously expensive medical treatment that the couple could not afford. League members didn't hesitate and raised in excess of \$17,000. That's what family and friends do.

I very much look forward to another great softball year. I will do everything in my power to ensure the league brings as much enjoyment to as many league members as possible. I am not naïve enough to think I can make all of the league members happy all of the time, but that won't stop me from trying. Andrew Bravo (. $786 \mathrm{OBP}, 1.091 \mathrm{SLG}, 10 \mathrm{R}, 11 \mathrm{RBI}$ ) of Slap a Pitch claimed the batting title with .818 AVG, while JR Hilsee (. 700 AVG, .800 SLG, 12 RBI) also helped the cause. Brad Milnes (. 800 AVG, 1.240 SLG, 15 R, 5 2B) of Phanatics led the league with .821 OBP, and male eddie Mike van Fossen (. 690 AVG, 862 SLG, 9 R, 3 2B, 15 RBI ) also made his mark. Ump Yours! saw its best performances from male eddies Scott Pataki (. 792 AVG, 1.417 SLG, 15 R, 9 2B, 3 3B, 18 RBI) and Bob Louderback (. 667 AVG, 1.042 SLG, 12 R, 3 3B, 16 RBI), with Nic Pataki (. 560 AVG, .720 SLG, 13 R, 4 2B, 12 RBI ) also posting a solid campaign. Wu Tang Forever was kept afloat by Kenny Goodwin (. 750 AVG, 1.083 SLG, 15 R), female eddie Katie Cherba (. 545 AVG, 667 SLG, 2 2B 11 R, 14 RBI), and male eddie Tom Egitto (. 667 AVG, .778 ALG, 2 2B, 11 RBI). Envi saw good things from Kyle Weller (. 762 AVG, .905 SLG, 3 2B, 9 RBI ) and Greg Delgado (. $600 \mathrm{AVG}, 1.050 \mathrm{SLG}, 9 \mathrm{R}, 42 \mathrm{~B}, 9 \mathrm{RBI}$ ) despite missing the playoff cut. Highlights for Dollar Dog Knights were provided by Austin Beck (. 688 AVG, 1.313 SLG, 10 RBI ) and Matt Cauto (. 667 AVG, .769 OBP, 11 R), who led the league with 8 BB.

The A-flight playoffs got underway with \#1 seed Wackers edging out \#4 seed No Shows (9-4) to gain a finals berth. Meanwhile, \#2 seed Dirt Dogs got a free pass to the finals courtesy of a forfeit from \#3 seed Hit \& Run. The championship series ended in a 2-game sweep for Wackers (21-1, 18-9) against the overmatched Dirt Dogs. Wackers rode the hot playoff bats of Robert Akers (. 800 AVG, 2.100 SLG, 8 R, 4 2B, 3 HR, 10 RBI), Bill Brancato (. 667 AVG, 1.889 SLG, 6 R, 2 2B, 3 HR, 8 RBI), and Sean Nonemacher (. 700 AVG, 1.100 SLG, 6 R, 4 2B, 3 RBI), while Matt Blankenstein (. 625 AVG, 1.375 SLG, 3 R, 2 HR, 6 RBI) and Matt Abramson ( .600 AVG, .700 SLG, 3 R, 4 RBI ) made strong showings for Dirt Dogs. In the B-flight, \#5 seed Slap a Pitch was victorious over \#8 seed Wu Tang Forever by the slimmest of margins (14-13), and \#6 seed Phanatics took care of Ump Yours! (16-12) to set the finals pairing. There, Slap a Pitch executed a 2-game sweep as well in a relatively low-scoring series (8-7, 6-3). Playoff performers were JR Hilsee (. 909 AVG, $10 \mathrm{H}, 6 \mathrm{RBI}$ ) and Harrison Miller (.700 AVG, 1.100 SLG, 5 R, 2 2B, 4 RBI) for the champions Slap a Pitch and male eddie Paul O'Connor (. 889 AVG, 2 R, 8 H ) and Brad Milnes (. 700 AVG, $1.000 \mathrm{SLG}, 4 \mathrm{R}, 4 \mathrm{RBI}$ ) for the runners-up Phanatics. Congratulations to Slap a Pitch for their 3rd title in franchise history, and first since Fall 2017! Wackers now had their 2nd A-flight title in 2023 (and a title for the 6th season in a row for Sunday Coed) and had compiled a record of 22-0 thus far in the calendar year - would they be able to complete a 3-title sweep in the fall season?

## FALL

All 9 teams from the summer season stayed on for the fall. I'd Hit That returned to the league, and two new teams joined as well to bring enrollment to 12 teams. Accordingly, the league reverted to the American/National League format and tiered playoff structure. To say the least, the weather was challenging in 2023, but the final games of the year were played on November 12th in advance of the Thanksgiving holiday.

While Wackers did not manage to pull off a 3rd undefeated season in 2023, they still finished at the top of the American League standings with a 6-2 record. Hit \& Run (5-3) were also bound for the A-flight playoffs. No Shows (4-4), Phanatics (2-6), and Slap a Pitch (2-6) made the B-flight cut, while Mad Batters (0-8) packed it in for the year. Wackers' lineup depth showed again, with Alex Freeman (. 800 AVG, 1.720 SLG, 19 R, 5 2B, 3 3B, 4 HR, 20 RBI, 43 TB), batting crown winner Sean Nonemacher (. 852 AVG, 1.444 SLG, 16 R, 7 2B, 3 3B, 9 RBI), Robert Akers (. 645 AVG, 1.484 SLG, 16 R, $52 B, 7$ HR, 23 RBI, 46 TB), Bill Brancato (. 609 AVG, 1.217 SLG, 14 R, 6 2B, 12 RBI ), female eddies Lissa Tercha (. 708 AVG, 1.125 SLG, 12 R, 4 3B, 9 RBI ) and Jamie Richards (. 611 AVG, $632 \mathrm{OBP}, 11 \mathrm{H}, 7 \mathrm{RBI}$ ), and male eddie Carman Brancato (. 381 AVG, .714 SLG, 4 extra-base hits, 10 RBI ) all posting excellent campaigns. Hit \& Run got a monster season from Shane Mulvihill (. 778 AVG, 15 R), who led the league with 1.926 SLG, 7 2B, $8 \mathrm{HR}, 30 \mathrm{RBI}$, and 52 TB . Teammates Brian Randazzo (. 741 AVG, 1.296 SLG, 15 R, 4 2B, 3 HR, 16 RBI), Matt Pinnell (. 643 AVG, 1.071 SLG, 3 3B, 11 RBI), Matt Korn (. 682 AVG, 1.227 SLG, 14 R, 4 2B, 9 RBI), male eddie Neal Hebert ( 500 AVG, 519 OBP, 9 R), and female eddie Carley Files (. 433 AVG, .500 SLG, 7 R, 5 RBI) all provided a big boost. Derek Strowhouer (. 762 AVG, 1.667 SLG, 11 R, 5 HR, 23 RBI) powered No Shows to a solid finish, while Sean Flannery (. 731 AVG, .750 OBP, $10 \mathrm{R}, 10 \mathrm{RBI}$ ), male eddie Larry Kirschner (. 680 AVG, .760 SLG, 2 2B, 11 RBI), and female eddies Kayleigh Bluntgen ( .435 AVG, .552 OBP, 7 R, 7 RBI, 6 BB ) and Jenn Flannery (. 435 AVG, $.522 \mathrm{SLG}, 4 \mathrm{R}, 4 \mathrm{RBI}$ ) made strong contributions. Despite appearing in only 5 games for Phanatics, Ian Cuozzo (. 722 AVG, 2.056 SLG, $14 \mathrm{R}, 3$ 2B, $7 \mathrm{HR}, 22 \mathrm{RBI}$ ) accomplished a lot, while female eddie Liz Trace (. 389 AVG, .542 OBP, . 556 SLG, 9 R, 3 2B, 6 BB) and male eddie Chris Harrison (. 600 AVG, . 625 SLG, 8 RBI) helped the team reach the postseason. For Slap a Pitch, Harrison Miller (. 545 AVG, 1.045 SLG, 10 R, 3 2B) had a noteworthy season, and the basement-dwelling Mad Batters got strong efforts from male eddie Mike van Fossen (. 556 AVG, .611 SLG, 10 H, 5 RBI). In the A-flight playoffs, \#1 seed Wackers set the tone early, comfortably knocking off \#2 seed Hit \& Run (16-6), stamping their own ticket to the finals. In the B-flight, \#4 seed Phanatics faced off against \#5 seed Slap a Pitch in a 1-game rematch of the previous season's B-flight finals. This time, Phanatics were victorious (13-11), and they carried their momentum into the semifinals against \#3 seed No Shows, winning another close game (17-13), claiming a spot in the B-flight championship.

After an 8-0 spring regular season followed by a summer season hiatus, Hagan's Heroes showed that they were ready to get back to business, compiling a perfect $8-0$ record again. I'd Hit That (5-2-1) finished in second and would face them

The 13 teams enrolled were placed into a balanced American/National League format wherein the top two teams from each league would vie for an "A-Flight" finals berth against the top team from the other league. ## American League

Did We Win were led offensively by Andrew Burgher (. 625 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 13 R, $52 \mathrm{~B}, 15 \mathrm{RBI}$ ) and Pete Mastapietro (. $633 \mathrm{AVG}, .767 \mathrm{SLG}, 13 \mathrm{R}, 42 \mathrm{~B}, 4 \mathrm{BB}$ ). In only 5 games, Conner Burke (. 579 AVG, 13 R, 5 2B, 11 RBI) smashed 4 HR for The Gabagools, while teammates Nick Geraghty (. 606 AVG, . 848 SLG, 14 R, 4 2B, 15 RBI), Jon Dobyan (. 576 AVG, .879 SLG, 13 R, 6 2B, 8 RBI), and Ajay Houston (. 567 AVG, . 867 SLG, 14 R, 11 RBI ) provided some lineup depth. Tap Daddy's had won the league championship in its inaugural season in Summer 2022 (when it existed as Wednesday Evening Men's), and the bats of Andrew Gernert (. 767 AVG, 20 R, 5 2B, 12 RBI), league leader with 1.667 SLG, 8 3B, and 50 TB, John Scott (. 765 AVG, 1.441 SLG, 19 R, 7 2B, 4 HR, 27 RBI, 49 TB), and Mike Divona (. 792 AVG, 1.375 SLG, $15 \mathrm{R}, 3 \mathrm{HR}, 17 \mathrm{RBI}$ ) demonstrated that winning potential remained. Red Stallion were the defending champions from Fall 2022, and Tom Jacob (. 750 AVG, 1.700 SLG, 11 R, 4 2B, 5 HR, 17 RBI), Pete Herbert (. 714 AVG, 1.143 SLG, 13 R, 8 2B, 10 RBI), and Colin Kennedy (.750 AVG, 1.250 SLB, 9 R, $32 \mathrm{~B}, 12 \mathrm{RBI}$ ) did all they could to get the team back to the winner's circle. Team Wasted Talent got strong contributions from Nick Smalley (. 667 AVG, 1.571 SLG, 11 R, 4 2B, 5 HR, 14 RBI), James Gillespie (. 609 AVG, 1.652 SLG, 11 R, 3 3B, $5 \mathrm{HR}, 23 \mathrm{RBI}$ ), and Ryan Logan ( 11 -for-15, $11 \mathrm{R}, 42 \mathrm{~B}, 9 \mathrm{RBI}$ in 5 games). Teammates Evan Grzymkowski (. 731 AVG, 1.115 SLG, 16 R, 7 2B, 9 RBI ) and Eric Shade (. 613 AVG, $1.000 \mathrm{SLG}, 14 \mathrm{R}, 3$ 3B, 10 RBI ) must have enjoyed the ride, but they also did pretty well in their own right. Doc's Irish Pub starred Dylan Brooks (.767 AVG, 1.400 SLG, 12 R, 4 2B, 5 HR, 26 RBI) and Josh Keszczyk (. 667 AVG, .939 SLG, 14 R, 4 2B, 15 RBI). The B-flight championship was also a 2-game sweep, with The Gabagools emerging victorious over Doc's Irish Pub (16-13, 15-7), despite the impressive playoff run of the latter following a mediocre regular season. ## SUMMER

League enrollment grew to a capacity 14 teams for the summer season, while the American/National League format and tiered playoff structure were abandoned in favor of an A and B Division format with separate playoffs.

## A Division

Wu Tang Forever, the defending champions, were looking to repeat, and they put themselves in a good position to do so, earning the \#1 seed with a 5-2-1 regular season record. For Wu Tang Forever, the usual suspects were back at it; Evan Porter (.724 AVG, 1.621 SLG, 13 R ,) posted some power numbers, leading the division with $1.621 \mathrm{SLG}, 8 \mathrm{HR}, 33 \mathrm{RBI}$, and 47 TB , and Keith Keppley (. 667 AVG, 1.028 SLG, 8 2B, 13 RBI) was tops with 21 R and 24 H, while Tom Koelzer, Jr. (. 704 AVG, 1.481 SLG, 19 R, 6 2B, $5 \mathrm{HR}, 18 \mathrm{RBI}, 4 \mathrm{BB}$ ) also enjoyed a successful summer campaign. Jake Steinberg (. 682 AVG), Tom Salami (. 560 AVG, .800 SLG, 10 R, $32 \mathrm{~B}, 11 \mathrm{RBI}$ ), and Connor Burke ( 9 -for-13, $8 \mathrm{R}, 3 \mathrm{HR}, 12 \mathrm{RBI}$ in 4 games) made the push for The Gabagools. Andrew Gernert (.767 OBP, 1.586 SLG, 7 2B, 5 3B, 21 RBI, 46 TB) came up big again for Tap Daddy's, winning the batting crown with . 793 AVG and leading with 21 R. Teammates John Gambone (. 630 AVG, .926 SLG, 13 R, 3 2B, 15 RBI) and Mike DiVona (. 548 AVG, .903 SLG, 14 R, 3 2B, 4 3B, 11 RBI) also factored into the offense. For Wackers, Alex Freeman (. 733 AVG, 1.200 SLG, 20 R, 11 RBI, 4 BB ) led the division with 9 2B, and Bill Brancato (. 762 AVG, 1.238 SLG, 10 R, 5 2B, 16 RBI ) and Dennis D'Angelo (. $613 \mathrm{AVG}, .839 \mathrm{SLG}, 16 \mathrm{R}, 3 \mathrm{2B}, 13 \mathrm{RBI}$ ) also posted good numbers. Colin Kennedy (. 633 AVG, 1.400 SLG, 19 R, 5 2B, 19 RBI, 42 TB) of Red Stallion led the division with 6 3B, while teammate Tom Jacob (13-for-16, $11 \mathrm{R}, 5 \mathrm{HR}$ in 5 games) also provided a boost. behind. Matt Scahub has the most career doubles (454) although his slowdown combined with Sean Nonemacher's assault on the 2-bagger records make Matt's mark very susceptible. Matt also controls the all time triples league lead with 149 for now, but Marc McKinney (137), Mat Crowell (133), Keith Keppley (123), and Sean Nonemacher (122) are right on Matt's bumper. Brian Penecale (retired) still owns the home run lead with 503. Matt Schaub (457) is in 2nd place only 46 behind. The only active member in the top 5 is John Kiefer and he has 233 dingers behind. If Matt can't overcome Brian, that record will stand for quite some time.

We had a new all-time batting champ last year in Kevin Roche. Well, move over Kevin, Pat Kelley is now the all-time league leader in the men's league batting average department (over 500 ABs ). Pat is crushing the ball at a whopping 685 clip in 564 plate appearance.
Kevin Roche maintains his all-time league leading run scoring percentage- scoring at a clip of $58 \%$. Kevin is till the best all-time RBI\% leader-knocking in a run $78 \%$ of the time. As far as the frequency with which a HR is hit, Shawn Hines stays atop the list. Shawn hammers one out in better than 1 in every 5 times to the plate ( $22 \%$ ). As far as slugging percentage is concerned, Kevin is still the slugging leader with at 1528 . Pat Kelley is a mere 29 points behind in that department. Matt Schaub is still the base on balls leader, getting a free pass 399 times in his career, but Rob McKenna is only 28 free passes behind. Nobody has a better base on balls average than Mike Sauler who earns a free pass better than 1 in 4 trips to the plate ( $28 \%$ ).

## Coed League Career Milestones

To give you an idea how much softball John Razzi played, he's been retired from the game for about 5 years and still remains the coed leader in games-played $(1,668)$ and at-bats $(4,932)$. His closest pursuer is Keith Keppley who is about 400 games and 700 at-bats behind. Keith the all-time hits leader ( 2,796 ). In doing so, he crossed the plate more than any player in coed history $(2,502)$. Keith also has the most doubles by a mile (861) and triples (308) along with the most RBIs $(2,320)$. Nobody scores a coed league run at a better clip ( $60 \%$ ) than Jarrett Kerns and Mike Chwieroth (retired). When it comes to coed slugging, Jarred Gardner is king. Jarred has hit more than 500 dingers in his coed career. Axel Alicea is the closest with 341 . CJ Motts is still the all-time batting average leader (733). In the base on balls department, Kris Pulli is the undisputed, all-time base on balls leader 487. Rhiannon Keppley still has the keenest eye at the plate with a walk in 1 out of 5 trips.

## Triple Crowns

Any player that reaches a career plateau of 500 or 1,000 career runs, career hits, and career RBIs shall earn a 500 or 1,000 Triple Crown award. Before last year, 56 men's league players had reached the Triple Crown 500 plateau. 7 have reached the Triple Crown 1,000 mark. 72 coed league players have made it to the Triple Crown 500 level while 9 have gotten to the coed Triple Crown 1,000 milestone. In 27 years of SBA existence, 8 league members have managed the incredible feat of acquiring what I call the Double Triple Crown-500 or more RUNS, HITS and RBIs in both the men's and coed leagues. Those seven players are, in order of acquisition, Rob Johnson, Keith Keppley, Steph Garrett, Jarred Gardner, Tim O'Shea, Jr., Warren Grant, Gene Walczak, and John Erb. Move over fellas and make room for Jason Pane who made the grade in 2023.

In the men's league, Frank Staber has just surpassed the 1,000 mark in Runs, Hits and RBIs. Tom Koelzer, Jr. Brandon Birkhead, Tom Rider, Chris Knechel, Jeff Hess, Ryan Maley, and Jason Pane made the Triple Crown 500 grade this past year. Each will receive a commemorative plaque.

A number of men's league players are currently on the Triple Crown doorstep. Shawn Rush needs 19 RBIs. With 2 Runs Scored and 18 RBIs, Bill Brancato will get there this year. Glen Hipple, KC Ingram, and Jose Rodriguez need only

used as a tie-breaker in the final standings, that number needs to be adjusted upward for the team that receives the forfeit in the forfeited game.
My team can't attend the post season. Can we give that spot to the team that just missed the playoffs?
The answer to this question is a resounding no. If we were to allow a team that didn't make the playoffs to take the place of a team that can't make the playoffs and that team wins in the first round, the team they beat would cry foul and for good reason because in essence we took the forfeit win away from them and now they don't get the chance to move on.
Why are we forced to take a batting out even if the opposing team is willing to waive it?
The answer here runs along the same lines as the previous question. Let's say a shorthanded Team A is playing Team $B$ with a faulty roster which dictates the team should take a batting out. Team B is willing to waive Team A's batting out and both the umpire and scorekeeper allow it. Let's also say Team B has already clinched a playoff spot, but Team A is on the bubble. If Team A loses, Team C makes the playoffs. Team A wins and Team C gets bumped from the post season. Because Team A was allowed to play without taking a batting out, affording them a better chance to win, Team C will cry foul and have every right to do so. In the name of fairness across the board, rules must be adhered to regardless of how innocuous bending one may seem.
A player has 6 games with another team, but wants to quit that team and play on my team. Can his games with the other team help him qualify for the post season with my team?

Absolutely not. First of all, a player that wants to quit a team in the middle of a season must have good reason to do so and present his case for doing so to the league office. Secondly, and I know this may be hard for you to believe (sarcasm) there are unscrupulous managers in the league that would do anything to win. Stealing good players from other teams as they head into the post season is not beyond the realm of possibility. To prevent this from happening, players not only need good reason the leave their existing squad, but they would need to qualify with enough games-played with their new team.
Why does a player have to pay a full league fee if there are only $\mathbf{3}$ games left in the season?
This league protocol is not about money. It's about maintaining roster control. If a team is merely adding to their roster, the new player must pay the full league fee regardless of how many games remain. This is to guard against teams trying to improve their rosters at discounted prices heading into the playoffs. Players can be added for a prorated amount if and only if they will be replacing another roster player on the team. Before these restriction, unscrupulous managers would

bring in stud players in week 6 and bolster for the post season at discounted league fees. I put a stop to that about 20 years ago.

## A non-roster sub that does not play in any league gets ejected from a game. Who serves the 1-game suspension?

 Prior to last year this had happened only one time in the history of the league. In that instance, the player did not play in another SBA league so the manager of the team he was subbing for was forced to serve the 1-game suspension. Any sub that plays in another league and gets ejected from a league he/she does not play in will serve his/her suspension in their next league game.Why are league member names posted under Conduct Unbecoming when a player is ejected and/or suspended?
Contrary to what some think, player names are not posted to embarrass anyone. As a matter of fact, when a player is ejected in the first game of a double-header and the player serves his/her suspension in the 2nd game, no posting is made. When a player must serve a suspension at some point in the future, postings are made to give advance notice to scorekeepers, umpires, and team managers so they can be on the lookout in the event a suspended player tries to circumvent the suspension.
I called for time in a game last year and the umpire let the play continue. Why is that?
Calling time while a play is in progress is somewhat of a misnomer. A player, coach, or manager cannot call time, they can only request that they be granted time. The only person in the game that can call time is the umpire. The next time you holler out, "TIME", remember you are only asking for time. You will get time only when it is granted to you by the umpire. The umpire can/will grant time if and only if in his/her judgment play has ceased. Until such time, the ball is live and game action can continue.

be honest, stopped caring. That--coupled with the fact that guys on our team would constantly call an hour before the game to say they couldn't make it, or not show up at all-were the main reasons I turned the reigns over to [manager name]. It just became too frustrating for someone as competitive as I am to deal with.

I listen to EVERYONE that comes to me with ideas and suggestions to improve the league. You would be no exception, but for the fact that you complain incessantly to anyone within earshot. Complainers get tuned out and whining falls on deaf ears. You may not want to hear this [player name], but among league scorekeepers, umpires, and your own teammates, you are known as a chronic complainer and malcontent.

So many of the current league perks are a direct result of league member suggestions. I'd be happy to list them for you and give you the league member's name that made suggestion if you do not believe. You, however, never came to me with suggestions, EVER! I know it sounds good for the sake of making your case in the email, but it's just not true and you know it.

Straight democracy all the time simply does not work in running the league. I've taken many votes on things, but not everything. There are many times I must do what is best for the greater good in spite of it not being a popular decision by the vocal minority. The bats and balls we use are a perfect example. If league members had their way, the game would be a very dangerous (and boring to most) HR derby instead of good, safe, and competitive softball. The 'slide or surrender' rule is rule I take a lot of heat for. If I didn't give a rat's butt, I would just take the easy way out and let league members kill themselves. The truth is, I have the 'nads to make the tough decisions for the greater good of the league and I live with the consequences every day.

You are the first person to ever complain about not having portable scoreboards. As long as the scorekeepers call out the score every $1 / 2$ inning, l'm fine with it and so is everyone else. Anyway, if you're in the game, you should have an idea as to the score of the game. If, in a crucial situation, you need to know score or outs, all you have to do is ask. I've played this game for more years than I care to think about, all without the luxury of a scoreboard. I always knew the score and how many outs there were in the game.

You are referring to a new field and a work in progress. When I found out the outfield wasn't cut, I called the township and let them know about it. I was the one that put the bases in and it was my intent to do so on an angle. I shifted everything to the right a little so the left field line stayed in play. If my groundskeeper used the wrong anchor for third base, it was by accident. If someone moved the pitching rubber, I can only fix it if I know about it. The other ball field you are alluding to is either an off-limit baseball field or the small girl's field with 200' fences. I spoke to the umpire about it and he agreed something was amiss. He is going to be more careful about how the bases are set up. Gee, there's port-a-potty right next to that ball field. I wonder who's paying for that? Do you think anyone knows it's me at the rate of $\$ 150.00$ / month? Of course not. But I did it so ball players wouldn't have to walk a $1 / 2$ mile to take a dump. This will go completely unnoticed by everyone, but I don't care. I did what had to be done.

People came to me last year about Unami being wet all the time. We no longer use that field. People came to me about CB West's infield turning to concrete in the summer. We are now using the varsity field. The difference between their way and yours is they came to me as an ally instead of an adversary - an ally to make the league better, not an adversary that complains all the time. We have a scorekeeper and umpire meeting every March. We go over everything in detail. No scorekeeper is perfect. Some are beginners. What you just did about a scorekeeper not knowing what a sac

If you let me know about an obvious scorekeeper error (an instance I can actually address), I will question the scorekeeper and correct their wrongdoings. Instead, you just took that issue, filed it away, and came to the conclusion ALL scorekeepers don't know what they're doing. More ammo to use in your arsenal of complaints.
