In all of SBA, there are a total of 4 what I call Super A teams. Super A teams not only have the max number of all-stars, but a lot of their all-stars are in the top 10% of league all-stars. Because there aren't enough Super A teams to make a Super A league, they are forced to com-

Men's League Career Milestones

The only constant in life is change. The same can be applied to baseball/softball records.

League veteran John Kiefer maintains the all-time men's league lead in games-played (1,120) and at-bats (3,801). Matt Schaub is right there trailing John by only 50 G and 100

ABs. Frank Staber is quietly moving up the ranks only 60 games-played behind.

Frank is now the all-time singles leader with 1,424. Matt Schaub has the most career doubles (495). Sean Nonemacher is now the all-time men's league leader in doubles and triples with a total of 514 2-baggers and 160 3-baggers. Brian Penecale (retired) still owns the home run lead with 503. Matt Schaub is a close 2nd with 467 dingers. The same holds true for career RBIs.

Regular & Post-Season Standouts

Pat Kelley will take home his second consecutive Men's league Player of the Year honors. Pat was an absolute force this year batting .774 and slugging a whopping .2075 for the year. His RBI% was 100, meaning on average he knocked in a run each and every time he stepped to the plate. Multi-year POTY recipient Shawn Hines finished 2nd in the point totals. Kyle Rossi, Jake Reichwein, and Mike Koelzer rounded out the top 5.

Coed league Core Player of the Year honors goes to a very deserving Jon Poore. Jon batted a league leading .765 and slugged at a rate of .1866. His RBI percent landed at 118 which meant he knocked in almost 1.25 runs on average every time he came up to bat. Brandon Birkhead ended the year 2nd in the point totals. Brandon batted .753 and slugged .1708. Brian Dart, Shawn Murphy, and Jason McLaughlin completed the top 5.

Tess Frelick will take her second consecutive women's POTY award. Tess batted .539 and slugged .785 in 191 plate appearances. Two-time POTY winner Sarah Yoos finished runner up in the point totals batted and slugging .700 and .800 respectively. Mary Kate Smith, Jenny Minnick, and

GFP, Hagan's Heroes, and Aces of Bases Claim A Division Championships. Pinball Nerds, Dirt Dogs, and Ump Yours Earn B Division Crowns.

The Sunday Afternoon Coed league of Softball America resumed in 2025 with all 2024 championship winners returning to compete for softball glory once again, including GFP (as the Wackers, winners of 9 out of the 10 previous A Division titles), Phanatic's Batmen (2-time B Division champions in the previous year), and JT Bankers. Would we see the continuation of a dynasty or perhaps the changing of the guard in 2025?

SPRING The league maintained the balanced American/National League format first implemented in Summer 2021 wherein the top two teams from each league would vie for an "A-Flight" finals berth against the top team from the other league. Likewise, the 3rd through 5th place teams would battle it out for a spot in the "B-Flight" finals against the advancing team from the other league. Play got underway on March 30th April 7th, with 15 teams in the mix.

American League In the American League, Hagan's Heroes grabbed the top seed, posting a 7-1 record. Dirt Dogs (5-2-1) secured the #2 seed and an A-flight playoff berth. Ump Yours (3-4-1), Mad Batters (3-5), and Alaskan Bullworms (3-5) made the B-flight cut, while Phanatic's Batmen (2-6) and The Instigators (1-7) fell short of the playoffs. For Hagan's Heroes, Jon Poore had a monster season, winning the triple crown with .848 AVG, 13 HR, and 41 RBI and also leading the league with 24 R, 28 H, .824 OBP, 2.152 SLG, and 71 TB. Wayne Horger, Jr. (.767 AVG, 1.133 SLG, 10 R, 13 RBI), Jay Pane (.679 AVG, 1.036 SLG, 20 R, 11 RBI, 7 BB), and female eddie Brittany Ullman (.600 AVG, 21 R, 4 BB) provided all the additional support this team needed. Dirt Dogs were led offensively by Joey Pittman (.700 AVG, 1.633 SLG, 14 R, 8 HR, 25 RBI), Dennis D'Angelo (.792 AVG, 1.583 SLG, 18 R, 3 3B, 3 HR, 21 RBI), female eddie Tess Frelick (.621 AVG, 1.207 SLG, 18 R, 3 HR, 19 RBI), and Derek Strowhouer (.556 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 7 2B, 9 RBI). Male eddies Scott Pataki (.542 AVG, .621 OBP, 13 R, 7 RBI, 5 BB) and Bob Louderback (.563 AVG, .750 SLG, 5 R, 3 2B, 3 BB) stood out for Ump Yours, and Christian Butrica (.556 AVG, .926 SLG, 9 R, 5 2B) and Anthony Rubas (.526 AVG, 1.158 SLG, 13 R, 3 2B, 3 HR, 11 RBI) also fueled the fire. Mad Batters got solid campaigns from male eddie Danny Torres (.619 AVG, .667 OBP, .810 SLG, 7 R, 3 BB) and Luis DeJesus (.636 AVG, .682 SLG, 9 RBI). Calvin Starosta (.760 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 12 R, 4 2B, 13 RBI), Sean Morris (.625 AVG, 1.125 SLG, 15 RBI), and Evan Morris (.583 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 13 R, 13 RBI) led the charge for Alaskan Bullworms. Though Phanatic's Batmen missed the playoff cut,

ago. If a team wants to forfeit, there ain't much we can do about it. Besides, the 1/2 game penalty drove league statisticians nuts.

I'm sad to say, all online message board game articles will cease and desist with the start of the 2026 softball year. As hard as I've tried to get the journalists to post timely articles, it just doesn't happen on any kind of consistent basis. Only 1 or 2 journalists have managed to stay somewhat timely, but the vast majority either post the articles extremely late or not at all and having to constantly prod them to get current is something I no longer desire to do. Nobody cares about old news. I will find better use for the article resources elsewhere.

Much like the Memorial and Labor Day coed 1-pitch tourneys, this year's Men's Fall Classic 1-Pitch will now be **draft style**. One all-star, 1 core player as managers. Speaking of the 1-pitch tourneys, as you know career statistics are currently compiled for the Memorial and Labor Day coed tournaments only. My plan for next year is to formulate and post career 1-pitch statistics for all men's 1-pitch tournaments.

Plan your softball year in advance armed with the knowledge that league games will NOT be played on Easter Sunday, Memorial Day and Labor Day Sundays and Mondays. Games **WILL** be played on Mother's and Father's Day Sundays as well as Halloween.

For some unknown reason, game ejections are down and believe me I'm not complaining, nor are the umpires. Either players are becoming more cooperative or umpires more tolerant-- one, the other, or both. Yearly game ejections have always averaged around 2 dozen. In 2024, a record low game ejections were issued (11) while last year's ejections totaled 16. That's a good thing.

If you head over to the league message board and click on the uppermost forum labeled Important Announcements, you will see a topic entitled Conduct Unbecoming. Players that have been ejected or otherwise exhibited unsportsmanlike behavior are listed there. When a player is ejected from a game, a mandatory 1-game suspension (and at times more) will ensue. This is non-negotiable. The best way to avoid game suspensions is to not get ejected in the first place.

League scheduling for 2026 will stay pretty much the same as in years past. Sunday Men's will see 5 separate divisions of play. Much like last year, single leagues such as Tuesday and Friday Men's will run as one division. Schedules in leagues that have a wide disparity of talent from top to bottom much like the Sunday Coed, Monday Coed, Wednesday Open will either be run in 2 divisions (A and B) or be divided into 2 equal leagues (American and National). With equally divided leagues (American and National), there will be no A or B division for the regular season. There will only be an American League and a National League. Teams will play each team in their own league and a couple of teams in the other league. Once the regular season is complete, the top finishers in each league will play for the A title. The remaining eligible seeds in each league will play for the B title.

After being unfairly bounced from our Monday lease at Stover Park in Telford last year, the Monday Open wood bat league is back for 2026. It's a great league that features recreational competition played on a really nice ball field. The inauguration of the Sunday Morning Men's wood bat league, also at Stover, kicked off last fall. This league promises to be a lot of fun and will also feature recreational competition. If you are interested in entering a team in one of these newer leagues, reach out to the league office ASAP as team spots are limited.

League umpires are taught to call what they see and nothing more. Unfortunately, everyone's perception differs and there in lies the issue. Ask any prosecutor or defense attorney and they will tell you eye-witness testimony is extremely unreliable. Imagine a very close play at first base. If you asked 10 people who saw the play to make the call, chances are 5 would call the runner out while 5 would call the runner safe. That's just the way it is. When an umpire makes a call on a play, he is merely calling it as he sees it. He didn't make the call to favor a team. He didn't make the call to hurt a team. He just called what he saw. Believe me, in the end it all evens out. Too many league members take umpire calls so personally that they proceed to unload on the umpire. Instead of letting loose and alienating the umpire, try talking to him respectfully. Let him know you thought he missed the call. If deep down he feels he may have, maybe on a subconscious level the next close call will go in your favor.

There is another umpire topic I would like to address and that is the tendency for league members to blame the umpire for their loss. This seems to happen more so on a questionable call toward the end of the game. Even if the score was close and that questionable call ended the game, you need to realize if the losing team would have taken care of business through the entirety of the game, chances are it would have never come down to that call. There are 42 outs in a 7 inning game of softball - 21 on offense and 21 on defense. I'm sure if you replay any lost game in your mind you will find a bunch of reasons why the team failed - all attributed to other than the game umpire. A few that come to mind are a fielding error with 2 outs that extended the opposing team's inning which allowed the flood gates to open or the pop-up to the pitcher with the bases loaded that ended your inning. If you really want to know the reasons why you lost a particular game, assemble the team in front of a mirror and take a good look. Therein lies your answer.

One of the most misunderstood league regulations pertains to post season eligibility. Time and time again, managers come to me pleading for me to qualify one or more of their ineligible players for post season play. Allow me to give you some pointers. Post season eligibility requires 3 or more games-played during the regular season. To avoid any issues, look to the future and be proactive. Don't offer me all sorts of excuses at the end of the regular season as to why your player didn't qualify because those excuses will fall on deaf ears. The last time I allowed a player with less than 3 games to play in the post season was never. If you see a player is in jeopardy of failing to qualify for the post season, do something about it. You can get a player game credits by taking a batting out for that player through the entire game. You can have that player show up and sub him/her into the game for an at-bat. You can start that player in the field and sub in for him at any time. If he/she is not listed on the scoresheet, a game credit will not be issued. If a player is injured, he/she can

show up at the field and tell the scorekeeper to place his or herself on the DL (disabled list). Any one of these moves would result in that player receiving a game credit. Also, when a team receives a forfeit, all players on the roster will receive a game credit toward post season eligibility. Players on the forfeiting team will NOT receive a game credit toward post season eligibility unless they were in attendance and their names on the scoresheet.

In the heat of competition, obscenities are bound to happen. I realize that. The game umps realize that as well. What I would like ask at this point is for ball players to keep the obscenities to a small minimum, especially when women and children are in attendance and/or when the game is played in a park setting. I've had numerous complaints in years past from league members who like to bring their kids to the game, but because of the unabashed use of blatant obscenities, they have now become reluctant to do so. I've also had complaints via the townships from passersby who've been offended by obscenities while visiting the park. The next time you feel the need to blow off steam with an obscenity, please, out of respect for others, exhibit a little self control.

When the regular season is over, league statisticians do not wait until all the week's stats are compiled. They put together the final standings the very next day and post the standings on the league message board under League Standings. This way teams know exactly where they are from a post season scheduling standpoint.

As I do every year, I will try my absolute best to avoid Saturday make-up games. Just know that when a league falls too far behind schedule, playing on a Saturday may be the only option.

League policy regarding postponements is very simple. If the ball field is playable at game time, the games are on save for extenuating circumstances. Some league members don't care about less than perfect field conditions and just want to play. Some don't want to play if a dog should so much as lift his leg near by. Others travel a distance to get to the field and don't want to make the trip for nothing. I can't favor one or the other. The best way to handle it is to have the ball field make the call. If playable, we play.

The consumption of alcohol at certain ball fields is strictly prohibited. All school district ball fields prohibit alcohol on school grounds. Hatfield prohibits alcohol on park grounds. Umpires will warn then eject any player(s) that fail to comply. Additionally, Hatfield has a strict '**no dogs allowed on park grounds**' policy. I strongly urge you to abide by these rules and regulations. Not doing so could result in our league losing its ball field permit and that is the last thing any of us want to see happen.

I look forward to another great softball year. I will do everything in my power to ensure the league brings as much enjoyment to as many league members as possible. I am not naïve enough to think I can make all of the league members happy all of the time, but that won't stop me from trying. I will continue to be unwavering with respect to rules and regulations even though it may cost me friendships and generate heartache. I will continue to make the tough decisions for the greater good of the league. I will place fairness at the forefront of each and every decision I make, just as I have always done. Do I profess to know it all? Oh no. Far from it. Do I have a perfect track record with respect to making the right decisions all of the time? Not by a long shot. However, the one thing I can promise you is if/when I do make a mistake, I will be the first to own up to it and do my best to right any wrong.

Have a great softball year! Don't push yourself too far, too fast, too soon. Most of us have been on the physically inactive shelf for months. The weather will be cold and the muscles still in idle mode for most. Ease your way into it.

Birds Of War would struggle to a 2-6 record, Jay Cowan 2 HR 11 RBI and Scott Chmura 1 HR 7 RBI tried to keep the team in the air. Dead Ringers would be in the middle at 4-4, Justin Longo 3 HR 14 RBI and Eric Katz 4 HR 13 RBI would keep the team battling. Dugout Demons coming off their big championship struggled to 1-6-1 in the summer, Pat Maloney 1 HR 10 RBI and Sam Smith 2 HR 12 RBI played well. Morning Wood would get up for the summer season going 7-0-1, Tim Frei 6 HR 24 RBI and Nick Pigott 2 HR 10 RBI had a good morning run. Philly's Phinest 6-1-1 would make a play for the top spot, Rob Phillipi 2 HR 15 RBI

male eddies Bill Jones (.800 AVG, 1.200 SLG, 8 R, 4 2B, 7 RBI), Charlie Phillips (.524 AVG, 6 R, 5 RBI), and Chris Harrison (.474 AVG, .565 OBP, 4 BB) turned in solid performances, as did Corey Van Fossen (.625 AVG, 1.167 SLG, 10 R, 7 RBI). The Instigators had some talent to build on, with female eddie Jenny Minnick (.696 AVG, .826 SLG, 6 R, 3 2B), Chris Abato (.714 AVG, 1.524 SLG, 11 R, 4 HR, 13 RBI), and Dan McFadden (.519 AVG, .889 SLG, 3 HR, 14 RBI) showing good production.

In the A-flight playoffs, #1 seed Hagan's Heroes advanced past #2 seed Dirt Dogs (13-9) to secure a berth in the A-flight championship series. #4 seed Mad Batters just barely edged out #5 seed Alaskan Bullworms (13-12), but fell to #3 seed Ump Yours in the semifinals (11-5), who thus advanced to the B-flight title series.

National League Seeking to continue their reign of domination, GFP stormed the National League, finishing with a 7-1 record. I'd hit That (6-2) earned the #2 seed and a spot in the A-flight playoff bracket. Pinball Nerds (5-3), Aces of Bases (4-4), and JT Bankers (4-4) qualified for the B-flight postseason, while Hit & Run (4-4) missed out based on a head-to-head tiebreaker and Slap a Pitch (3-5) and One Day at a Time (2-6) finished further back. GFP was powered by batting crown winner Kyle Rizzi (.875 AVG, 19 R, 5 2B, 5 HR, 5 BB), who also led with 0.867 OBP, 1.792 SLG, 25 RBI, and 43 TB. Teammates Bill Brancato (.727 AVG, 1.091 SLG, 20 R, 16 RBI), Robert Akers (.741 AVG, 1.148 SLG, 21 R, 5 2B, 14 RBI), and male eddies Eric Schade (.867 AVG, 1.233 SLG, 13 R, 26 H, 23 RBI, 37 TB) and Carman Brancato (.533 AVG, .767 SLG, 9 R, 8 RBI) made GFP formidable. I'd Hit That owed their strong team showing to the bats of Anthony Rapposella (.760 AVG, 1.360 SLG, 16 R, 5 2B, 18 RBI), Chip Taylor (.708 AVG, 1.542 SLG, 13 R, 7 2B, 3 HR, 14 RBI), and female eddie Carly Levin (.652 AVG, 7 R, 4 RBI). Pinball Nerds were led by Joe Sulpizio (.655 AVG, 1.207 SLG, 16 R, 7 2B, 12 RBI), Sean Flannery (.821 AVG, 1.036 SLG, 12 R, 12 RBI), Joe Fresolone (14-for-17, 11 R, 5 3B, 19 RBI), and male eddie Chris Lento (.577 AVG, .731 SLG, 9 R, 8 RBI). Ryan Hensman (.636 AVG, 1.682 SLG, 12 R, 6 HR, 17 RBI) and Jarrett Kerns (.818 AVG, 1.273 SLG, 13 R, 4 3B, 13 RBI) swung the hot bats for Aces of Bases. Male eddie Greg Hess (.652 AVG, .739 SLG, 12 R, 11 RBI), female eddie Lauren Hess (.667 AVG, .714 SLG, 5 R, 3 BB), and Dan Croak (.667 AVG, 1.250 SLG, 10 R, 3 HR, 16 RBI) propelled JT Bankers to a playoff berth. Though the team barely missed the postseason, Hit & Run saw great campaigns from Matt Pinnel (.692 AVG, 1.269 SLG, 12 R, 3 HR, 19 RBI), Zay Rodriguez (.759 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 15 R, 18 RBI), Gene Schwendemann (.826 AVG, 1.130 SLG, 20 R, 5 2B, 9 RBI), Matt Korn (.607 AVG, 1.107 SLG, 12 R, 25 RBI), and female eddie Carly Files (.607 AVG, .645 OBP, 13 R, 8 RBI, 3 BB). Likewise, Slap a Pitch could build on the performance of Harrison Miller (.737 AVG, 1.526 SLG, 10 R, 3 HR, 15 RBI). One Day at a Time saw strong seasons from Tim Frei (12-for-17, 10 R, 3 HR, 12 RBI), female eddie Brianna DeYoung (.714 AVG, .857 SLG, 10 R, 3 2B), and male eddie Glen Strattis (.600 AVG, 6 R, 9 RBI), but that somehow didn't translate to the win column. The A-flight playoffs saw #1 seed GFP topple #2 seed I'd Hit That (12-8) to move to the A-flight championship series. Meanwhile, #4 seed Aces of Bases knocked off #5 seed JT Bankers (8-5) to advance to the semis, but there they met their match in #3 seed Pinball Nerds, succumbing in a 21-3 beatdown. With that, Pinball Nerds moved on to play for the B-flight title.

A-Flight and B-Flight Championships In the A-flight championship, GFP came out swinging, taking game 1 from Hagan's Heroes by the narrow score of 16-13, Hagan's Heroes gamely fought back, eking out a game 2 win (14-13). But GFP was unleashed in game 3, a 16-1 blowout. The B-flight finals opened with Ump Yours victorious over Pinball Nerds in a tight game (8-4). Pinball Nerds stormed back, convincingly winning game 2 (17-8) and carrying the momentum through game 3 (22-7) to claim the title. Congratulations to Pinball Nerds for their spring season title win, and to GFP/Wackers for securing a Sunday Coed title in 11 consecutive seasons dating back to Fall 2021!

SUMMER The summer frame saw 14 teams return. The same American/National League format was retained for the regular season, as was the "A-Flight"/"B-Flight" format for the playoffs.

American League GFP continued to perform, claiming the #1 seed with a 7-1 regular season record. Outkasts (6-2) rounded out the A-flight playoff bracket. The Instigators (4-3-1), Phanatic's Batmen (4-4), and Hit & Run (2-5-1) secured B-flight playoff spots, while defending champion Pinball Nerds (2-6) failed to make the cut, as did Slap a Pitch (1-5-2). The talent on GFP was deep; Alex Freeman (.727 AVG, 1.500 SLG, 17 R, 7 2B, 14 RBI), Jarrett Kerns (.778 AVG, 1.185 SLG, 17 R, 8 2B, 14 RBI), Sean Nonemacher (.714 AVG, 1.476 SLG, 3 HR), female eddie Mary Kate Smith (.733 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 12 R, 1 HR, 7 RBI), and male eddie Eric Schade (.577 AVG, .846 SLG, 8 R3 2B, 8 RBI) led the way. Antonio Lillo (.690 AVG, 1.483 SLG, 14 R, 7 2B, 5 3B, 23 RBI) and female eddie Becky Yerk (.500 AVG, .600 SLG, 5 R, 4 RBI, 3 BB) drove the Outkasts' summer success. The Instigators saw strong seasons from Dan McFadden (.560 AVG, 1.120 SLG, 9 R, 4 3B, 15 RBI), Corey Wambold (.538 AVG, 1.038 SLG, 15 R, 3 3B, 11 RBI), and Eric Rosenblum (.800 AVG, 1.133 SLG, 5 2B, 8 RBI). Ian Cuozzo (.826 OBP, 15 R, 5 2B) had a massive season for Phanatic's Batmen, leading the league with .818 AVG, 2.227 SLG, 8 HR, and 49 TB, while teammates Scott Gerhart (.550 AVG, 1.100 SLG, 9 R, 5 2B) and male eddie Mike Van Fossen (.619 AVG, 13 H) added support. Female eddies Vicki Morales (.526 AVG, .632 SLG, 6 RBI) and Carly Files (.448 AVG, .483 SLG, 10 R, 4 RBI) led the way for Hit & Run, as did teammate Gene Schwendemann (.688 AVG, 1.125 SLG, 10 R, 8 RBI), who led the league with 9 BB. Despite a disappointing season outcome, Pinball Nerds got some highlights from Brian Tucker (13-for-18, 10 R, 16 RBI) and Sketch Morgan (.565 AVG, 1.174 SLG, 11 R, 3 HR, 8 RBI). Likewise, Slap a Pitch could rely on male eddie Glen Strattis (.640 AVG, 6 R, 10 RBI) and female eddie Kim Williams (.526 AVG, .591 OBP, 10 R, 9 RBI). The A-flight semifinal game was somewhat of a shock upset, with #2 seed Outkasts toppling the dynastic GFP team (14-11) to gain their berth to the championship series. Meanwhile, in the B-flight, #5 seed Hit & Run rolled past #4 seed Phanatic's Batmen (20-9), following that up with a victory over #3 seed The Instigators (16-6) to get their B-flight title shot.

National League Hagan's Heroes claimed pole position in the National League with a 7-1 record. Ump Yours (6-2) garnered the #2 seed on the basis of a head-to-head win over I'd Hit That (6-2), so the former entered the A-flight, while the latter was primely positioned in the B-flight. Dirt Dogs (4-4) and Alaskan Bullworms (3-5) rounded out the playoff picture. Blue Devils (2-6) and No Shows (0-8) got a 2-week hiatus to regroup. Hagan's Heroes showed impressive roster depth, with Jason McLaughlin (.778 AVG, 1.556 SLG, 3 HR, 14 RBI, 42 TB), league leader with 17 R, 21 H, and 12 2B, Sean Murphy (.588 AVG, 1.147 SLG, 13 R, 7 2B, 4 HR, 22 RBI), Jay Pane (.690 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 14 R, 7 2B, 16 RBI), Keith Keppley (.667 AVG, 1.042 AVG, 12 R, 5 2B, 13 RBI), female eddies Kay Motts (.607 AVG, .656 OBP, 7 R, 4 BB), and Mandi Sheehan (.542 AVG, .621 OBP, 11 R, 5 BB) paving the way. Ump Yours was lifted by the performances of male eddies Dave Porco (.680 AVG, 1.280 SLG, 7 2B, 2 HR, 9 RBI) and batting title winner Scott Pataki (.800 AVG, 1.200 SLG, 8 R, 2 HR, 7 RBI), female eddie Melissa Nigro (.579 AVG, .632 SLG, 4 R, 5 RBI), Anthony Rubas (.563 AVG, 1.344 SLG, 16 R, 5 2B, 6 HR, 19 RBI, 43 TB), and Joe Berry, league leader with 17 R (.543 AVG, .971 SLG, 3 HR, 10 RBI). I'd Hit That was led by Chip Taylor (.667 AVG, 1.625 SLG, 16 R), league leader with 6 HR and 26 RBI and Shawn Hayes (.500 AVG, 1.167 SLG, 13 R, 5 HR, 16 RBI). Female eddie Carly Levin (.591 AVG, 7 RBI) and male eddie Roger Sternfeld (.480 AVG, 7 R, 6 RBI) also bolstered the cause. Dirt Dogs got big help from Joey Pittman (.800 AVG, 1.650 SLG, 14 R, 5 HR, 15 RBI), Derek Strowhouser (.654 AVG, 1.462 SLG, 15 R, 5 2B, 4 HR, 17 RBI), Dennis D'Angelo (16-for-20, 14 R, 17 RBI), and female eddies Jamie Gosselin (.692 AVG, .923 SLG, 7 R, 1 HR, 14 RBI) and Tess Frelick (.632 AVG, .947 SLG, 14 R, 2 HR, 13 RBI). For Alaskan Bullwirms, Evan Morris (.621 AVG, 1.207 SLG, 16 R, 6 2B, 4 3B, 14 RBI) and male eddie Joe Healy, Sr. (.429 AVG, .500 SLG, 7 R) forged the path. Though they did not see playoff action, Blue Devils saw some bright spots from Shawn Thornton (.625 AVG, 1.125 SLG, 10 R, 6 2B) and female eddie Linzy Phillips (.579 AVG, .619 OBP, 6 R, 5 RBI) as did No Shows from male eddie Larry Kirschner (.500 AVG, .563 SLG, 3 BB). In the A-flight playoffs, #1 seed Hagan's Heroes earned the win over #2 seed Ump Yours, advancing to the championship against Outcasts. In the B-flight, #4 seed Dirt Dogs edged out #5 seed Alaskan Bullworms (18-15), then rolled past #3 seed I'd Hit That (11-5) to earn their finals berth.

A-Flight and B-Flight Championships

The A-flight finals got underway with National League champs Hagan's Heroes delivering a pounding to Outcasts from the American League (17-2). Hagan's Heroes never looked back, providing more of the same for an easy two-game sweep (14-2). In the B-flight, Dirt Dogs took the series edge in a close game with Hit & Run (12-11), but Hit and Run fought back to even things up in game 2 (10-6). When everything was on the line, Dirt Dogs continued their great playoff run with a game 3 victory (9-5) to seal the deal. Congratulations to Dirt Dogs for their summer season title win, and to Hagan's Heroes for their return to the top, their first A-flight title since Fall 2022!

FALL League enrollment dropped to 12 teams for the fall frame, and once again, the American/National League format and tiered playoff structure were employed to close out the year.

American League With GFP not participating in the fall season, there was a vacuum at the top of the American League, and the summer finalists Outcasts filled it, posting a 6-2 record. Dirt Dogs (5-3) grabbed the #2 seed and an A-flight playoff berth on the basis of a forfeit loss for Reese's Tavern (5-3), who claimed the #3 seed. Ump Yours (3-5) and I'd Hit That (2-6) rounded out the B-flight playoff pool, while Slap a Pitch (2-6), head-to-head losers against I'd Hit That, missed the playoff cut for the third time this year. Outcasts road to the top was paved by the performances of Antonio Lillo (.762 AVG, 1.286 SLG, 13 R, 5 2B, 13 RBI), Eric Adiletto (.714 AVG, 1.095 SLG, 13 R, 10 RBI), and female eddies Jamie Richards (.579 AVG, .619 OBP, 10 R) and Becky Yerk (.545 AVG, 8 R). Dirt Dogs got help from many contributors, including Derek Strowhouser (.667 AVG, 1.333 SLG, 13 R, 3 HR, 15 RBI), Scott Chmura (.630 AVG, 1.296 SLG, 13 R, 7 2B, 3 HR, 18 RBI), Nick Pigott (.538 AVG, 1.154 SLG, 13 R, 6 2B, 11 RBI), Matt Abramson (.789 AVG, .826 OBP, 12 R, 4 BB), and female eddies Tess Frelick (.684 AVG, .789 SLG, 12 R, 7 RBI, 6 BB) and Kate Valesky (.500 AVG, .542 OBP, 8 R). For Reese's Tavern, Zach Harding (8-for-12, 10 RBI, 3 BB) led the league with 4 HR, despite playing in only 4 games. Teammates Jarred Frondheiser (.708 AVG, .958 SLG, 9 R, 4 2B, 12 RBI), Shawn Riley (.704 AVG, .733 OBP, 15 R), Scott Gerhart (.706 AVG, 1.118 SLG, 14 R, 4 BB), and male eddie Mike Van Fossen (.500 AVG, .682 SLG, 10 R, 13 RBI) also boosted the team with good campaigns. Ump Yours featured a well-rounded attack, including Joey Berry (.615 AVG, 1.077 SLG, 14 R, 3 HR, 12 RBI), Nic Pataki (.516 AVG, .968 SLG, 9 R, 4 3B, 14 RBI), male eddies Dave Porco (.696 AVG, 1.261 SLG, 11 R, 4 3B, 14 RBI) and Bob Louderback (.429 AVG, .586 OBP, 6 R, 6 RBI, 8 BB), and female eddie Emily Grove (.529 AVG, .588 SLG, 6 R). I'd Hit That saw good production from Shawn Hayes (.565 AVG, 1.07 SLG, 10 R, 15 RBI), female eddie Selina Margicin (.524 AVG, .583 OBP, 6 RBI, 3 BB), and male eddie Roger Sternfeld (.360 AVG, .407 OBP, 4 R). In an off-season, Slap a Pitch's best performer was Matt Milkowich (.682 AVG, 1.045 SLG, 8 R). In the A-flight playoffs, #1 seed Outcasts took their first step toward another shot at the crown, defeating #2 seed and defending B-flight champion Dirt Dogs (12-8). In the B-flight, #4 seed Ump Yours handled #5 seed I'd Hit That (11-4), then toppled #3 seed Reese's Tavern (14-12) to stamp their ticket to the B-flight championship.

National League Fresh off of a title run, Hagan's Heroes (7-1) claimed the #1 seed on the basis of head-to-head versus Aces of Bases (7-1). Hit & Run (5-3), JT Bankers (3-5), and The Instigators (3-5) fell in line for B-playoff frame. Phanatic's Batmen (0-8) had a disastrous season, failing to make the playoffs just one year after winning two titles. Ian Cuozzo (.815 AVG, 1.815 SLG, 19 R, 7 2B, 6 HR, 19 RBI, 49 TB), batting crown winner Wayne Horger (.846 AVG, 1.385 SLG, 13 R, 10 2B, 12 RBI), and Sean Murphy (.739 AVG, 1.304 SLG, 11 R, 7 2B, 17 RBI) put up big numbers for Hagan's Heroes, while male eddie Ron Pulli (.542 AVG, .667 SLG, 8 R, 12 RBI) and female eddies Kaelyn Motts (.435 AVG, .478 SLG, 8 R, 7 RBI) and Mandi Sheehan (.412 AVG, .583 OBP, 6 R) made this a deep lineup. Aces of Bases boasted some deep talent

Red Stallion got solid campaigns from Jack Dombrowski (.600 AVG, 1.600 SLG, 9 R, 4 HR, 16 RBI) and Dom Anzideo (.739 AVG, 1.087 SLG, 14 R, 9 RBI). Muckdogs stayed afloat thanks to Ryan Hamilton (13-for-17, 11 R, 8 RBI) and Evan Grzymkowski (.722 AVG, .889 SLG, 15 R). Despite the disappointing seasonal outcome, Nicholas Weston (.524 AVG, 1.714 SLG, 14 R, 15 RBI), league leader with 8 HR, and Justin Rosenbaum (.625 AVG, 1.292 SLG, 10 R, 4 3B, 9 RBI) offered some hope. In the A-flight semis, #1 seed Wackers wasted no time dispatching #2 seed Quit Your Pitchin' (20-3) to advance to the finals. #5 seed Muckdogs narrowly toppled #4 seed Red Stallion (15-14) to begin the B-playoff night, then barely edged #3 seed Mayhem (14-13) to gain a B-flight finals berth.

Gabagools were powered by Eric Bowren (.667 AVG, 1.593 SLG, 19 R, 7 HR, 25 RBI, 43 TB), Tom Salami (.688 AVG, 1.313 SLG, 22 R, 5 3B, 25 RBI, 42 TB), and Jake Steinberg (.606 AVG, 1.242 SLG, 12 R, 4 3B, 3 HR, 21 RBI, 41 TB), and it's noteworthy that teammate Kevin Raymond (.586 AVG, .659 OBP, 14 RBI) led the league with 22 R and 10 BB. Sean Murphy (.739 AVG, 1.609 SLG, 15 R, 6 2B, 4 HR, 19 RBI) and Richie Hall (.680 AVG, 1.280 SLG, 13 R, 7 2B, 12 RBI) emerged as leaders for Quit Your Pitchin'. For Red Stallion, Jack Dombrowski (.900 AVG, 2.050 SLG, 15 R, 5 HR, 22 RBI, 41 TB) won the batting title, and teammates Kyle Budynkiewcz (.733 AVG, 1.533 SLG, 18 R, 4 3B, 5 HR, 19 RBI, 46 TB) and Dom Anzideo (.625 AVG, 1.188 SLG, 18 R, 5 3B, 13 RBI) furthered their cause. Ohtani's Bookies got the production they needed from Nicholas Weston (.632 AVG, 1.737 SLG, 11 R, 7 HR, 18 RBI) and Justin Rosenbaum (.607 AVG, 1.179 SLG, 13 R, 9 RBI). Despite disappointing seasons, Did We Win got solid numbers from Jon Fine (.600 AVG, 1.050 SLG, 14 RBI), as did Clinchers from Jack Long (11-for-17, 10 RBI). In the A-flight playoffs, #1 seed Wackers had no problem with #2 seed Gabagools, downing them 18-7 and garnering another finals berth. Team Glowcharge was boosted by good campaigns from Dan Hughes (12-for-17, 11 R, 6 2B), Dillion Lamb (.700 AVG, 1.100 SLG, 12 R, 6 2B), and Jimmy Murphy (.577 AVG, .962 SLG, 9 R, 3 HR, 13 RBI). Derek Strowhouer (.643 AVG, 1.786 SLG, 14 R, 9 HR, 35 RBI) posted eye-popping power numbers for Mayhem, and teammate Josh Sovocool (.692, .714 OBP, 13 R) balanced the attack. Though their season may have been disappointing, Yard Ducks had some bright spots in Craig Solomon (.583 AVG, 1.292 SLG, 14 R, 3 HR, 16 RBI), Mike Remphrey (.640 AVG, 1.040 SLG, 13 R, 3 3B, 10 RBI), and Paul Brazil (.632 AVG, 1.263 SLG, 10 R, 6 2B). Continuing their

Matt is 81 ribbies behind Brian at this point. We had a new all-time career batting champ in 2024 in Kevin Roche, but he has now been displaced by Pat Kelley (768). Kevin moves to 3rd place all-time (681) as Shawn Hines moves into 2nd (689). Pat is also the all-time slugging % leader at 1676. Pat also maintains the all-time league leading run-scoring percentage—scoring at a clip of 59%. Shawn Hines is now the all-time RBI% leader—knocking in a run 79% of the time.

As far as the frequency with which a HR is hit, Pat Kelley is now atop the list. Pat hammers one out at almost 1 in every 4 at-bats (24%). Matt Schaub is still the base on balls leader, getting a free pass 419 times in his career. Nobody has a better base on balls average than Austin Sher who earns a free pass in almost 1/3 of his trips to the plate (31%).

Coed League Career Milestones

To give you an idea how much softball John Razzi played, he's been retired from the game for about 6 years and still remains the coed leader in games-played (1,668) and at-bats (4,932). His closest pursuer is Keith Keppley who is less than 400 games and 700 at-bats behind. Keith is the all-time hits leader (3,042). In doing so, he crossed the plate more than any player in coed history (2,629). Keith also has the most doubles by a mile (905) and triples (322) along with the most RBIs (2,482). Nobody scores a coed league run at a better clip (60%) than James McLaughlin and Jarrett Kerns. When it comes to coed slugging, Jarred Gardner is king. Jarred has hit more than 500 dingers in his coed career. Keith Keppley has now moved into the 2nd slot with 346. CJ Motts is still the all-time batting average leader (732). In the base on balls department, Kris Pulli is the undisputed, all-time base on balls leader 514. Rhiannon Keppley still has the keenest eye at the plate with a walk in 1 out of 5 trips.

Triple Crowns

Any player that reaches a career plateau of 500 or 1,000 career runs, career hits, and career RBIs shall earn a 500 or 1,000 Triple Crown award. Before last year, 68 men's league players had reached the Triple Crown 500 plateau. 8 have reached the Triple Crown 1,000 mark. 74 coed league players have made it to the Triple Crown 500 level while 10 have gotten to the coed Triple Crown 1,000 milestone. In 27 years of SBA existence, 11 league members have managed the incredible feat of acquiring what I call the Double Triple Crown—500 or more RUNS, HITS and RBIs in both the men's and coed leagues. Those eleven players are, in order of acquisition, Rob Johnson, Keith Keppley, Steph Garrett, Jarred Gardner, Tim O'Shea, Jr., Warren Grant, Gene Walczak, John Erb, and Jason Pane. Move over fellas and make room for Jon Poore who made the grade in 2025.

In the men's league, Mat Crowell has just surpassed the 1,000 mark in Runs, Hits and RBIs as did CJ Snyder and Shane Hanna. Jon Poore, Pat Kelley, Evan Porter, Tim Frei, Mike Suda, Jay Cowan, Shawn Rush, and Jason Ashworth reached the Triple Crown 500 Promised Land this past year. Each TC winner will be the recipient of a commemorative plaque.

Worth noting is Jon Poore became the only player in league history to reach the Double Triple Crown 500 in the same year.

On the coed side of things, Keith Keppley is 18 RBIs away from becoming the first-ever Triple Crown 2500. I never thought I'd ever see that happen in my lifetime. Paul O'Connor hammered out his 2,000th base hit. Bill Brancato and Kevin Shinkunas reached the coveted TC1000. Chase Luxton, Wayne Horger, Jr., Jarrett Kerns, and Jon Poore have now joined the TC500 club. Congrats on this year's Triple Crown inductees.

Odds & Ends

In the record setting department, Philly Junk (Tuesday Men's) shattered the single season team home run record that stood for 16 years. In 2009, 99 Restaurant hit 53 dingers in 8 games. This past Tuesday Men's league spring season saw Philly Junk finish with 68 home runs, crushing the old record by 15. Geez, talk about murder's row. 6 other seasonal

pete vs. teams quite a bit inferior to them. This is not fun for the Super A teams, nor is it fun for the lesser quality team. Myself, along with select members of the league Rules and Competition Committee, (Curt Hensman, Bill Shipe, Bill Brancato, Gene Walczak, Tom Koelzer, Jr., and Greg Thompson), have worked extremely hard this off-season looking at ways to address this competitive imbalance. We all believe the following rule implementation will help. While we don't think it's an end-all panacea, we do believe it's a start in the right direction. If it needs to be tweaked a little next year, one way or the other, we can certainly address it for 2027.

ALL-STAR/CORE RULE (MENS): This rule applies to men's leagues only. It does not apply to Open leagues. A men's league team playing with 5 or fewer all-stars will not be affected by the All-Star/Core Rule. A men's league team playing 6 all-stars must have in the line-up at all times not less than 5 core players. A men's league team playing 7 all-stars must have in the line-up at all times not less than 6 core players. A men's league team playing 8 all-stars must have in the line-up at all times not less than 7 core players. For each core player below the minimum, the defaulting team's opponent will start the game with a 3-run lead. Examples: Your team shows up with 7 all-stars and only 4 core players. With 7 all-stars, 6 core players are needed, but you only have 4. The 2 missing core players would equate to 6 runs (2x3) given to your opponent to start the game. If your team shows up with 6 all-stars and only 4 core players, the one missing core player would equate to 3 runs (1x3) given to your opponent to start the game. In the event a core player on a team playing 6 or more all-stars has to leave the game at any time and for any reason (injury, ejection), the team will be in default and must give the opposing team 3 runs at the point of the default. It shall be the sole responsibility of the acting team manager to ensure his team is legal and to notify the scorekeeper if his team is not legal. Teams found in default of the All-Star/Core Rule will be subject to game forfeit if a grievance is lodged with the league before the offending team's next game.

There are no changes to Open and Coed league all-star rules. I've included them below strictly for reference.

ALL-STAR CAP (OPEN): Not more than 5 all-stars are permitted in an Open league batting line-up at any given time. If at any point before a team's next game, a team is discovered to have been over the all-star limit in their last game, that team will be subject to forfeit if a grievance is lodged with the league before the offending team's next game.

ALL-STAR/EDDIE RULE (COED): A coed team playing with 4 or fewer all-stars will not be affected by the All-Star/Eddie Rule and can bat and field as few as 3 eddies (minimum 2 females). A coed team playing 5 all-stars must bat 5 eddies, 4 of which must be female with not less than 3 females playing the field. A coed team playing 6 or more all-stars must

FALL

The fall season saw 12 teams return. With only 5 of those teams placed in the National League, only the 3rd and 4th place finishers would make the playoff cut there. Play continued until November 12th, when the B-flight championship series was played to conclude the softball year.

American League

The top two finishers in the American League happened to be opponents in the B-flight finals during the summer season. Quit Your Pitchin' (6-1-1) took the top seed based on a regular season win over Piss Missiles (6-1-1). Muckdogs (6-2) were not far behind, and took pole position for the B-flight playoffs. Gabagools (5-3) were just one game back, and Mayhem (3-5) grabbed the final playoff spot based on head-to-head against The Trainwrecks (3-5). Clinchers (0-8) also got an early jump on their off-season. The offense of Quit Your Pitchin' featured Richie Hall (.625 AVG, 1.167 SLG, 12 R, 7 2B, 3 3B, 11 RBI), Sean Murphy (.542 AVG, 1.292 SLG, 12 R, 4 HR, 14 RBI), Justin Lyons (.609 AVG, 1.043 SLG, 12 R, 5 2B), and Alex Mitchell (.750 AVG, .833 SLG, 10 RBI). Meanwhile, Piss Missiles had some big bats of their own – most notable Jon Poore (18 R, 5 2B, 6 HR), who led the league with .846 AVG, 1.731 SLG, 27 RBI, and 45 TB. Teammates Matt Bookheimer (.714 AVG, 1.238 SLG, 13 R, 13 RBI), John Erb (.720 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 14 R, 15 RBI), and Joe Aurelia (.640 AVG, 1.040 SLG, 11 R, 14 RBI) also increased the compete level. Muckdogs picked up Brandon Birkhead (13-for-17, 9 R, 22 RBI), who led the league with 7 HR despite playing only 4 games, adding to a deep roster that also included Ryan Hamilton (.654 AVG, 1.077 SLG, 15 R, 6 2B, 14 RBI) and Brett Anker (.714 AVG, .857 SLG, 14 R). Tom Salami (.657 AVG, 1.171 SLG, 20 R, 9 2B, 3 3B, 12 RBI, 41 TB), Jake Steinberg (.676 AVG, 1.147 SLG, 14 R, 6 2B, 19 RBI), and James Muhlberger (.619 AVG, 1.476 SLG, 11 R, 3 HR, 14 RBI) continued to produce for Gabagools. Mayhem's season was aided by the performances of Derek Strowhouser (.679 AVG, 1.250 SLG, 1 R, 3 HR, 19 RBI), Josh Sovocool (.647 AVG, 1.029 SLG, 14 R, 6 2B, 12 RBI), and Randy Worthington (.720 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 14 R, 10 RBI, 4 BB). Though slightly derailed in their quest for a playoff spot, The Trainwrecks saw good things from Joey Percell (8-for-13, 7 R, 2 HR, 8 RBI). There is not too much to say about the offense of Clinchers, as the team scored only 20 runs all season. In a rematch of the previous season's B-flight finals between two very evenly matched teams, Quit Your Pitchin' pulled off another very narrow victory against Piss Missiles (10-9), stamping their ticket to the A-flight finals this time. In the B-flight, #4 seed Gabagools eliminated #5 seed Mayhem (13-8) before succumbing to #3 seed Muckdogs (14-11). Muckdogs appeared poised for yet another deep playoff run.

National League

Live Wires featured a very balanced attack, with Carson Coates (.778 AVG, 1.558 SLG, 17 R, 8 2B, 3 HR, 16 RBI, 42 TB), Brent Anderson (.731 AVG, 1.308 SLG, 14 R, 4 HR, 18 RBI), batting crown winner Anthony Santoleri (.800 AVG, 1.500 SLG, 13 R, 4 HR, 16 RBI), Matt Lewis (.600 AVG, 1.067 SLG, 16 R, 3 HR, 11 RBI), Robby Collins (.536 AVG, 1.071 SLG, 12 R, 3 HR, 23 RBI), and Jenny Minnick (.568 AVG, .703 SLG, 20 R, 3 2B, 8 RBI, 4 BB) all making significant contributions. For Did We Win, Pete Mastro (.682 AVG, .720 OBP, 8 R) represented the biggest offensive threat. The Cheaters got what they needed from Matt Kovaleski (.657 AVG, .943 SLG, 17 R) and Rob Tomkinson (.520 AVG, 1.040 SLG, 9 R, 4 HR, 14 RBI) to get to the postseason. Kyle Budynkiewcz (10-for-16, 7 R, 4 HR, 12 RBI) provided highlights for Red Stallion in an otherwise disappointing campaign. In the A-flight semifinal matchup, The Yips defeated Live Wires (13-6) to get back to the championship series. Meanwhile, #4 seed The Cheaters convincingly unseated #3 seed Did We Win (27-15) to move on to the B-flight finals.

A-Flight and B-Flight Championships

The A-flight championship series was a high-scoring one, with the winning team scoring at least 20 runs each time. In game 1, The Yips pounded Quit Your Pitchin' (25-10) to take an early series lead. But Quit Your Pitchin' clawed back, taking a very close game 2 (21-20) and forcing the rubber match. There, The Yips again scored 20 runs, and this time it was enough for the title win (20-19). In the B-flight finals, Muckdogs carried out a two-game sweep of The Cheaters (15-10, 10-5), concluding a very successful year for them. Congratulations to The Yips for yet another A-level Wednesday Evening Open title and to Muckdogs on their second B-flight title in 2025!

bat 6 eddies, 5 of which must be female with not less than 3 females playing the field. If a team is found to have been in default of the All-Star/Eddie Rule, that team will be subject to forfeit if a grievance is lodged with the league before the offending team's next game.

ALL-STAR STATUS: Any men's league player listed as an all-star whose all-star status was derived strictly from B league numbers shall NOT be considered an all-star in the men's A league. Any coed league player listed as an all-star whose all-star status was derived strictly from B league numbers shall NOT be considered an all-star in the coed A league. This will NOT HOLD TRUE for men's B league all-stars playing in the coed league. Any men's B league all-star shall be considered a coed all-star in any coed league. All-stars are determined by the league and shall be adjusted yearly. Softball America shall reserve the right to change a new member's status from season to season if, in the judgment of the league, that member is of obvious all-star ranking.

Horrible that the umpire completely botched this play on the field & equally disappointing that it can't be rectified. I have been a part of this game for over 40 years & have never seen a re-do in my life. Can you please provide the rule/ email/any other documentation that states a "re-do" is acceptable at any time? That would be much appreciated. By you making the statement "**While his decision to replay the at-bat may or may not have had an impact on the outcome of the game,...**" leads me to believe you have not been properly prepped re: the situation.

Instead [my team] batting in the top of the 3rd w/ a 1-1 score w/ momentum after turning a triple play, this was reversed into a 11-1 score after giving [our opponent] an extra 3 outs & basically rendering the game over. This CERTAINLY had a bearing on the game. Additionally, it was 13-1 heading into the 6th inning- that would've been a 3-1 game had the 10 run inning been not occurred. We scored 3 in that inning so it would've been up 1 heading into the later innings where anything could have happened. So, to say this call did not impact the game is just false. The final score was 18-4 which would have been 8-4 which is a more manageable (& fun) game. Unfortunately, most of my team's energy was wasted trying to get our heads around the lunacy that occurred & was allowed (& is being condoned by this decision).

In all honesty, [umpire name] is a terrible umpire & a piece of [expletive] as a human being. His history w/ our previous sponsor is clearly biasing his calls in every single one of our games. It would be great to have a [different umpire] if we have to continue to play at [a different field] but, my life is spent dealing w/ morons so what's one more on [league night].

Now that my rant is over, here's a list of some constructive criticism/continued grievances: Handling of the situation by the umpire: This would have been much more palatable if any type of explanation of the reversal was given. Both managers should have been consulted & it should have been explained that: he messed up, this is what he was going to do to fix it. it wasn't going to make me happy. I had the right to protest if I wanted but his decision was final. That would have been the more respectable thing to do. Cool. Let's play ball & see what happens. But, no, what I got was basically get back on the field or I'll throw you out. I really had no choice but to protest by the way it was handled. He also said he needed \$25 immediately if I wanted to protest- another call he got wrong. Pathetic.

Handling of the situation by you: There are umpires on the field. You are setting a dangerous precedent by allowing teams to call YOU mid game to make complaints. This process took a few minutes. By ASA rules, which you claim to follow, any protested call needs to be made while both teams are still on the field. My team was in the dugout celebrating a great play, getting ready to hit, & all of the air was yanked out of our sails w/o any real notice, explanation, etc. By that rule alone, the call should not have been able to be overturned. The correct call would have been to not overturn the call, have the opposing team protest the game (which they likely would have won), & replay the game. This is why I feel your final decision here below is severely flawed.

So, no, I honestly don't accept "Mistakes happen. Nobody is perfect. To err is human. To forgive is divine." especially when my team is (& has been for the last 3-4 years) on the losing end of almost every bad call. I've sat back b/c I know you get bombarded probably hourly by cry-babies talking about how the ump missed a bang-bang play at first & other minor BS. Les, this is not a bang-bang play at first. The ump missed a basic rule that most little league umpires know & it cost us the game. It's hard for me to accept so many rules being blatantly ignored in this case &, well, the ump just made a mistake, give him a break. He threatened to throw me out for asking for an explanation of this unique, complex situation then again when I told him I was protesting. He also gave my team a warning on the 2nd pitch of the game for ask-

ing about the height of a pitch. He threw 2 guys out of a later game for who know what. No, no, he gets no f'ing passes in this case. I've been in this league for the better part of a decade & have always given you & the umpires the benefit of the doubt but, SBA blew this one from beginning to end. I feel that we paid for 8 games this summer & only got to play 7. Not the best season Les.

My Reply

It would be nice, [Name], if you got the facts straight before you started throwing darts at people. I don't know what you're talking about when you say I allowed a team to call me mid-game. No team ever called me before, during, or after the game. The umpire never called me during the game. I didn't hear about this issue until I read your email. I don't know who was called and why, but it wasn't me. A game stoppage to get the call right is commonplace in pro sports leagues via replay. It is not only permissible in Softball America, but highly encouraged.

I understood exactly what happened on the play. The line drive hit first base, popped up and was caught in mid-air. The umpire called 'out' as if it was a caught fly ball because in his mind it never touched the ground. The base is part of the playing field so it should have been ruled a ground ball not a caught fly ball. His erroneous call froze the base runners resulting in a triple play. Like I alluded to in my initial email to you, nobody is perfect. You can be around this game for 100 years and yet something will come up that has never come up before. I certainly wouldn't have made such a lighthearted comment about the play if I knew you were taking this more seriously than cancer so I will extend to you an apology.

On each and every league schedule it states - Protest Bond: \$25.00. It is also clearly written in our league rules. Umpire discretion is a part of many rules. Where to place a runner after an interference call is just one that comes immediately to mind.

A protested call does NOT have to be made while both teams are on the field. Any call can be protested as long as it is lodged before the next pitch is thrown or before the umpire leaves the field of play on a call that ends the game. This is also clearly written in our league rules.

The ASA and Softball America have a zero tolerance policy when it comes to arguing balls, strikes, and pitch height. The fact that our umpires don't immediately eject, which they have every right to do, is a testament to their tolerance level.

[Umpire name] is a highly respected ASA of PA and USA Softball umpire. He's worked thousands of ASA state tournament games. In my opinion he is an excellent umpire. There are some that dislike him because he doesn't put up with nonsense and refuses to take any crap. If you get chippy with him, you will get it right back.

USA Softball is our governing body. Unless stated otherwise in our local league rules, Softball America will follow the ASA lead when it comes to rules and regulations. As I mentioned earlier, the ASA response to this was that the play and what followed after the call was not covered by any set rule so, according to the USA Softball, it becomes an **umpire discretionary call**. Only a faulty rules interpretation can be protested. The fact that there is no specific rule on this renders any protest null and void. This was and is the USA Softball stance. If you want to take it up with the President of USA Softball, you have my blessing. His name is Bob Ream. He is the one that ruled umpire discretion. His contact information is listed below.

It is unfortunate things turned out as they did and I understand your frustration. Had the call been to let the triple play stand, the opposing team would be up in arms and I would understand their frustration as well. The umpire's decision to redo the at-bat was in his mind the fairest way to handle it. I cannot and will not fault him for that and neither will USA Softball.
